BEBASHI's Annual Report for 1986--AIDS AND MINORITIES: A CRISIS IGNORED--is the first comprehensive look at how AIDS has impacted on Philadelphia's minority community. The report analyzes the successes and failures of AIDS-related education and service efforts, the many obstacles to access to those services for poor and minority people, and solutions BEBASHI believes are urgently needed to care appropriately for people with AIDS and help others avoid contracting the disease. The Annual Report also reviews BEBASHI's accomplishments in 1986--and its plans for further success in 1987.

AIDS AND MINORITIES: A CRISIS IGNORED outlines the effect--or lack thereof--on minority communities of the services of Philadelphia Community Health Alternatives/Philadelphia AIDS Task Force, ActionAIDS, the AIDS Hotline, IMPACT and the Locke Fund, and of public services provided by the Philadelphia Dept. of Health and Dept. of Human Services. BEBASHI also offers its analysis of programs such as the AIDS Housing Program and the AIDS Unit of the Philadelphia Nursing Home, as well as the performance of the private sector and the media in helping prevent the spread of AIDS.
