



BLACKS AND OTHER THIRD-WORLD GAYS ARE HIGHLY SUSCEPTIBLE TO AIDS, ALSO.

The U.S. Public Health Service reports that as of August 12th there are 1,972 reported cases of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). Of the cases reported in the U.S., 57% of the victims are white, 26.8% are Black, 14.7% are Hispanic, the remaining 1.5% are of unknown racial identity. To date 759 cases have resulted in fatality. Figures indicate that at least 41.5% of those who have contracted the disease are minorities.

Whitman-Walker Clinic has set up an AIDS Education Fund to help combat this mysterious disease. The Fund offers its services to all in need, and is making a special effort to serve the needs of the Black community in the D.C. area, since a larger than anticipated proportion of AIDS victims are Black males.

Whitman-Walker Clinic is working to educate the public about preventive measures and to support efforts by medical experts towards developing effective treatment. The clinic also provides many AIDS related support services.

Volunteers are urgently needed to help plan and implement programs, and to staff the AIDS Hotline, which is open 7 days a week. To offer time and services call the number below.
